Instrumentation

Vibes, 4 Octave Marimba, Agogo Bells, Basket Shakers or Maracas, Cajón, Shaker, Splash Cymbal, Mark Chimes, Hi Hat

Performance Notes for **Plot**

There are dead strokes indicated in the mallet parts. Perform these by using one mallet to strike the bar in the normal manner and using the other mallet to produce a dead stroke - which is lighter & brighter in quality.

Slash notation in each part indicates a solo, played ad lib by the performer.

Open and closed sounds are indicated in the hi-hat part.

Slash notation in the cajòn part also indicates a rhythmic "fill" used to setup the next musical phrase (ala drum set). One hand uses a brush to create a snare drum effect while the other hand continues to produce bass tones (meas. 30 - 55).

Since cajòn music is often improvised, the player should experiment with the notated "open tones". The cajòn player may use alternate playing spots and techniques in performing the open tones: the use of ghosted tones, use of fingers and/or finger tips, playing in the corner, playing at the top, and changing pitch with a foot slide - are a few of the tonal variations that should be experimented with.
